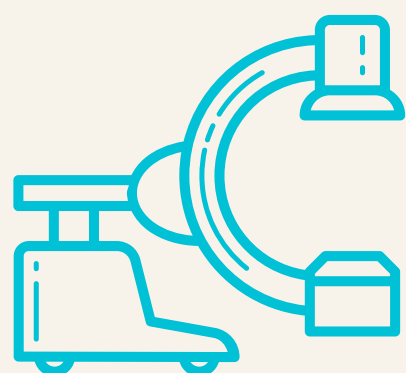


# Dr. Kornelia Kreiser's top 4 tips: Creating an Immersive Simulation Training Program

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## Angio Suite Integration

Speak with your Angio-suite provider to check compatibility and invest in both a Mentice VIST Simulator and the Virtual Patient Link to conduct fully immersive training environments, with 20-minute sessions in angiographic environments for the most realistic experience.

## More than one Proctor

It would be viable to have several proctors available so that the training sessions do not depend on the presence of a single person. Through simulation training, valuable procedure time is saved, and in return, you can also utilize the extra time for more hands-on training.



## Setting Clear Goals

Training is better accepted if clear goals are formulated in advance. However, this does not mean that a predetermined number of simulations must be set, but more that the training objective is achieved.

## Patient-Specific Rehearsal

Ideally, real patient cases should be rehearsed on the simulator to look out for case-specific challenges and address them accordingly. Cases should also be accompanied by intensive discussions about the treatment indication and management of complications.
